Non-Residents Test 72 hours before departure, and upload negative result into the Alaska Travel Portal . 	<p>If a non-resident arrives without a pre-test, testing is available for \$250 per test. The traveler will be required to quarantine while waiting on results.</p> <p>If a non-resident is still in the state after 7 days, a second test should be taken 7-14 days after arrival.</p> <p>Strict social distancing is allowed for travelers coming to Alaska who have one negative test taken within 72 hour of departure or on arrival. This 14-day window can be shortened by receiving a negative result from a qualifying negative COVID-19 test taken between 7-14 days after arrival into Alaska. Until a second negative test result is returned, or 14 days have passed, travelers should practice strict social distancing.</p> <p>Alaska Residents</p> <p>Testing remains available at no cost to Alaska residents.</p> <p>14 day quarantine is still available to Alaska residents.</p> <p>A second test should be taken 7-14 days after arrival. 	<p>Critical infrastructure travel</p> <p>Critical infrastructure companies will continue to operate under their existing plans as before, but a few key changes have taken place for critical infrastructure workers:</p> <p>Critical infrastructure workers traveling to Alaska will no longer be able to use state-funded testing at airports.</p> <p>Critical infrastructure companies and organizations will be asked to provide employees with a letter on company letterhead that states they are a critical infrastructure worker traveling for work purposes. These letters need to include detailed instructions on how the employee will travel, as well as the company's isolation or quarantine plans in accordance with their Community/Workforce Protective Plan.</p> <p>Travel that is deemed essential or for critical personal needs, as previously defined in Health Mandate 10, will continue as it has under existing guidance. This includes, but is not limited to, child custody exchanges or visitation, and military families relocating under orders.</p>

District of Columbia	<p>Beginning today, Monday, July 27, anyone coming into Washington, DC from a high-risk state (within the prior 14 days) who was traveling for non-essential activities will be required to self-quarantine for 14 days from their arrival in the District. Individuals traveling from high-risk states after essential travel or arriving in the District for essential travel are required to self-monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days and, if they show signs or experience symptoms of COVID-19, they are to self-quarantine and seek medical advice or testing. The list of states below are considered high-risk.
